A Wonderfull Relation Of what happened to

Dr. Moore In the County of WICKLOW in IRELAND.

ID R. Moore having lately purchafed an Effate in the County of Wicklow, did (together with Mr. Richard Uniack, and one Mr. Laughlin Moore) about three weeks fince, go down to view his concerns there: And being come to their Inne, at a place called Dromgreagh near Baltinglass, where they intended to Lodge that Night; the Doctor began a difcourse of several things that happened to him in his Childhood near that place, and that it was about 34 years fince he had been in that Country: That he had been often told by his Mother, and several others of his Relations, of Spirits which they call'd Fairies, whor used frequently to carry him away, and A 2 continue continue him with them for some time, without doing him the least prejudice : But his Mother being very much frighted and concern'd thereat, did as often as he was milling, fend to a certain Old Woman, her Neighbour in the Country, who by repeating fome Spells or Exorcifms, would fuddenly caufe his return. Mr. Uniack used several Arguments to diffwade the Doctor from the belief of to idle and improbable a Story ; But notwithstanding what was faid to the contrary, the Doctor did politively affirm the truth thereof. And during the dispute, the Doctor on a ludden starting up, told them the must leave their Company, for he was called away. Mr. Uniack perceiving him to be railed off from the ground, catches falt hold of his arm with one hand, and intwined his arm within the Doctor's arm, and with his other hand graspt the Doctor's shoulder; Laughlin Moore likewise held him on the other fide : But the Doctor (maugre their frength) was lifted off the ground. Laughlin Moore's fear eauled him prefently to let go; but Mr. Oniack continued his hold, and was carried above a yard from the ground, and then by fome extraordinary unperceived force was compelled to quit. The Doctor was hurried immediately out of the Room, but whether conveyed through the window, or out at the door, they being to affrighted none of them could declare.

The two Gentlemen being greatly furprized at the ftrangenels of the accident, and troubled for the loss of their Friend, call'd for the Inn-keeper, to whom they related what had befalm their Companion. He feen'd not

not to be much terrified thereat, as if fuch difafters were common thereabouts ; but told them, That within a quarter of a mile there lived a Woman, who by the Neighbourhood was call'd a Wife-woman, and who did usually give Intelligence of feveral things that had been loft, and of Cutel that were gone altray, and he doubted not but if the Woman were fent for, the could refolve them where their Friend was, and by what means conveyed away. They for hwith fent a Meffenger for the Woman, who being come, Mr. Uniack demanded if the could give them any account of a Gentleman, one Dr. Moore, that had been Spirited out of their Company about an hour before. The Woman told him the could, and that he was then in a Wood about a mile diftant, preparing to take Horfe; that in one hand he had a Glass of Wine, in the other a piece of Bread; that he was very much courted to eat and drink, but if he did either, he should never be free from a Confumption, and pine away to death. Mr. Uniack gave the Woman a Cobb, and defired her to use fome means for preventing his eating and drinking. ; She answered, He should neither eat nor drink with them: And then ftruck down her hand, as if the were friatching at fomething. When the had thus done, the often repeated a Spell or Charm in Irifb, the fubstance whereof was; First she runs his Pedigree back four Generations, and calls his Anceftors by their feveral Names; then fummons him from the East, the Weft, the North, and the South, from Troops and Regiments, effectially from the Governour mounted on the Sorrel Horle, dec. And after having repeated the Charm, the gave

gave them an account of the several places the Doctor should be carried unto that Night.

As first, from the Wood to a Danes Fort about seven miles distant, where there should be great Revelling and Dancing, together with variety of Meats and Liquors; to the eating and drinking whereof he should be very much importuned, but promised the would prevent his doing either. And from that Fort he was to be carried twenty miles farther, where there would likewise be great Merriment, and then to the Seven Churches; and towards Day-break should be return'd safe to the company of his Friends, without any dammage or mischief whatfoever: and so took leave of Mr. Uniack and Mr. Moore.

About fix a clock the next morning, Dr. Moore knocked at the door, and being let in, defired Meat and Drink might be provided for him, for that he was both hungry and thirsty, having been hurried from place to place all that Night : And after having refresh'd himfelf, difcours'd of the manner of his being taken away; That it feem'd to him there came into the Room about twenty men, fome mounted on Horfeback, others on foot, and laid hold on him; That he was fenfible of Mr. Uniack's and Mr. Moore's endeavours to have kept him, and of the force they used ; but it was all to no purpose, for had there been fourty more they would have fignified nothing; That from the Houfe he was carried to a Wood, about a mile distant, where was a fine Horfe prepared, and as he was about to mount, mount, a Glais of Wine was given him, and a cruft of Bread; but when he offer'd to eat and drink, they were both ftruck out of his hand; That from thence he went in the fame Company that had taken him away, to a Daner Fort about feven miles from the Wood; That he imagined himfelf to be mounted on a white Horfe, whole motion was exceeding (wift, and when they came to the Fort, their Company multiplied to abour three hundred large and well-proportioned Mon and Women: Ke who feem d to be Chief, was mounted on a Sorrel Horfe; that they all difmounted and fell to dancing, and that it came to the Doctor's turn to lead a Dance, which he did remember the Tune he danced unto.

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That after the dancing, there appear'd a molt fumptoous Banquet, and the Governour took him by the hand and defired him to cat; which he feveral times attempted, but was prevented by fomething that fill ftruck the Meat out of his hand: And fo gives an account how from thence he was carried to the feveral places the Old Woman had mentioned the Night before; and that about break of day he found himfelf alone within fight of the Inne.

Mr. Uniack was fo curious as to go feven miles out of his way, to fee the *Danes* Fort, and the Doctor washis Guide; who traced the path he had travelled the Night before fo exactly, that if his Horfe went but ayard out of the track, he would prefently turn himinto it again; and that upon view of the Fort, he found

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ound the Grass so trodden down, and the Ground beaten, as if five hundred men had been there.

This was related by Mr. Uniack in the prefence of one Dr. Murphey, a Civilian, Dr. Moore himself; and Mr. Ludlow, one of the Six Clerks of the High Court, of Chancery, November 18. 1678.
